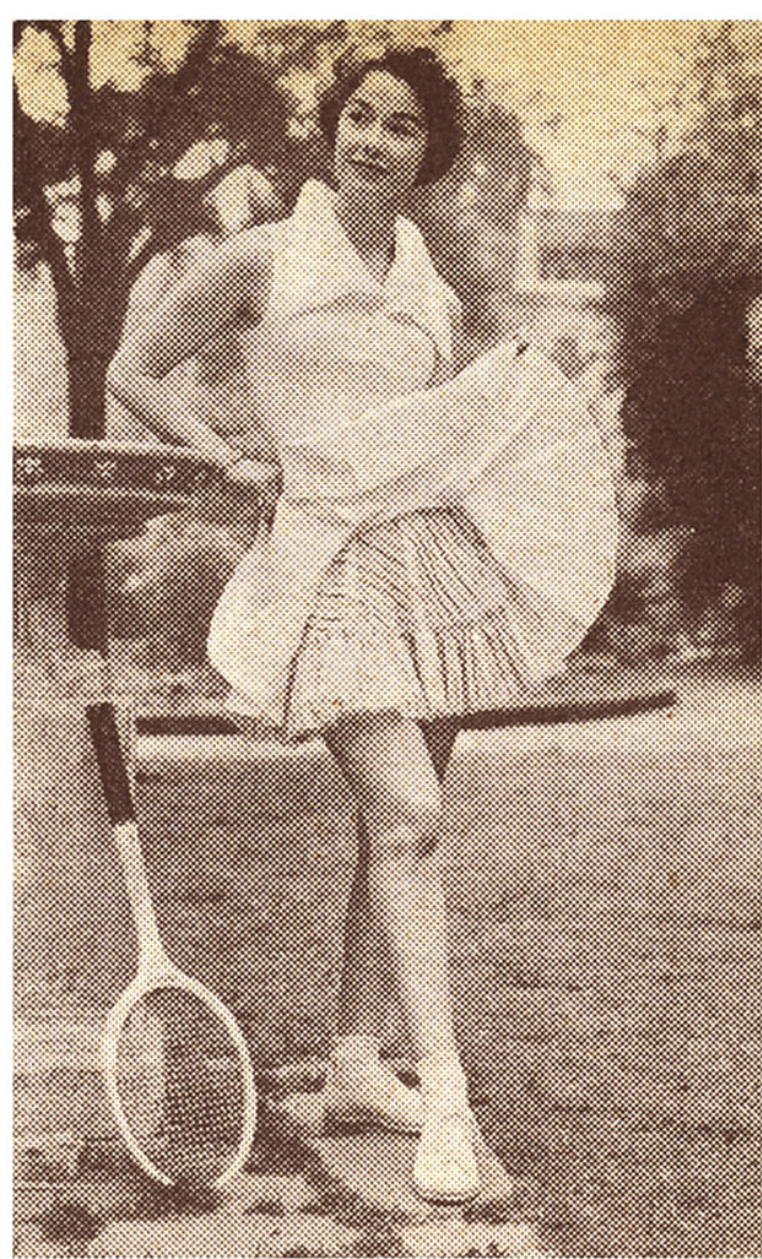
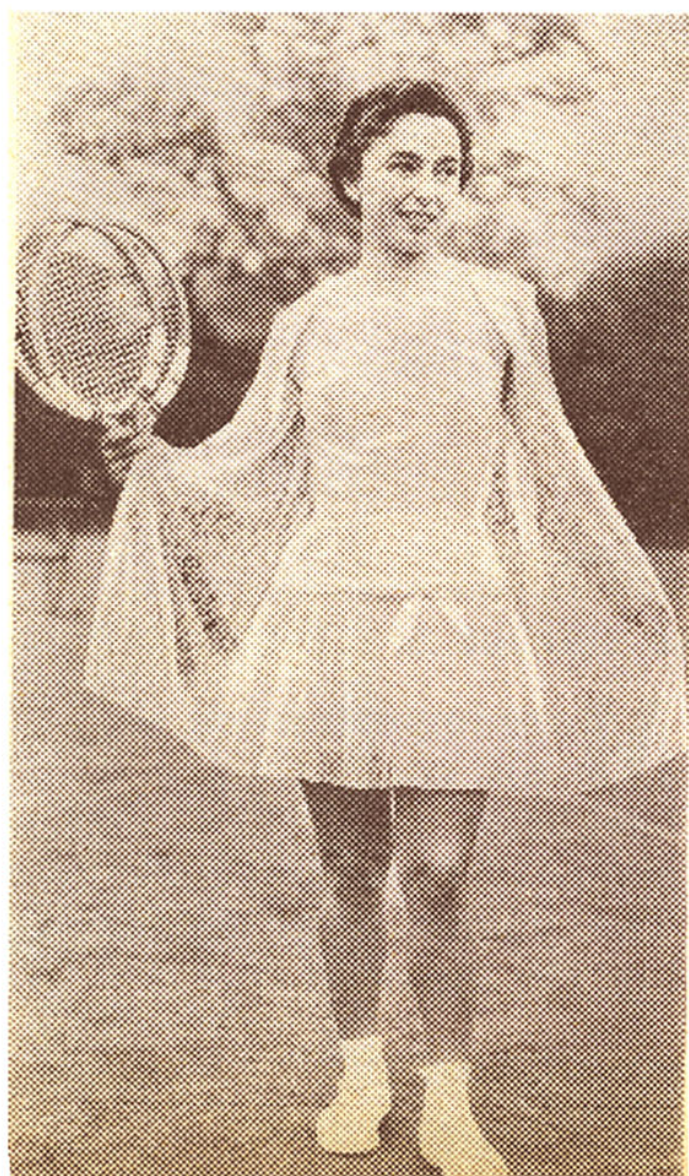


COURT COSTUMES LIKE THIS CAN BE SERIOUS SPECTATOR HAZARDS

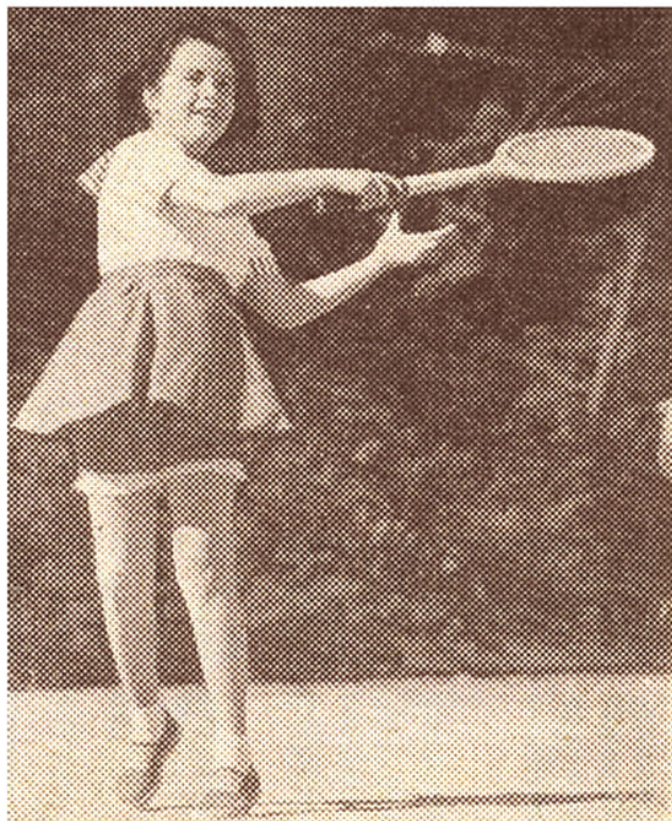
