

## Trenton Must Show Cause For Its Jim Crow School By Edmund Scott

TRENTON, Sept. 18.—Trenton's

Negro population of some 10,000 residents has won its first round in a legal battle to break the City's 20-year-old Jim Crow policy of segregating Negro children in local junior high schools. Negro children in the seventh, eighth and ninth grades are re-

stricted to the New Lincoln Junior

High School, and are barred from attending Trenton's four other junior high schools. As a result of action taken by parents of two Negro children, Supreme Court Justice Newton H. Porter has ordered the Trenton

Board of Education to show cause Oct. 4 why the two children should not be assigned to Junior High School No. 2, one of the schools restricted to white pupils.

The petitions also charge that New Lincoln Junior High, which was built in 1922 at the time the Jim Crow policy was put into effect, is overcrowded and offers a substandard curriculum. Mrs. Hedgepath charges further that her daughter, Janet, 12, has been unable to pursue commercial studies since the New Lincoln Junior High offers only a straight aca-
