Lincoln, killed. May 4. Surrender of Dick Taylor, and rebel forces east

of the Mississippi, to Gen. Cauby, at Mobile. 10. Jeff. Davis and suite captured in Wilkinson Co., Ga.

23-24. Grand review of Gen. Meade's and Gen. Sherman's armies at Washington.

26. Surrender of Kirby Smith and all rebel forces west of the Mississippi.
