

THE CONQUEST OF THE NORTH ATLANTIC BY AIRPLANE AND DIRIGIBLE

The various crossings that have been made by sirpiane from Portugal, Spain, and Italy, across the South Atlantic to South America, consisted of a series of comparatively short "hops." These flights began in 1922, when Cabral and Coutlinh flow from Lisbon to Rio do Janiero. Early in 1926 Commander Ramon Franco flow from Palos, Spain, to Buenos Aires, a distance of 6,230 miles, and since then Colonel De Pinedo hav negotiated the distance between Rome and the Argentine city.
