**B**ARRING accidents, Lucille Ball tomorrow will occupy the spot now disputed by Carole Lombard, Joan Crawford and Ginger Rogers—as the First Lady of Hollywood. Lucille deserves to get it, and she has what it takes to get there. The red-headed ex-chorus girl has talent, ability, looks, personality, and the willingness to take every punishment on her way up.

And Lucille is taking a beating. Nominally called a star, through the casual generosity of
