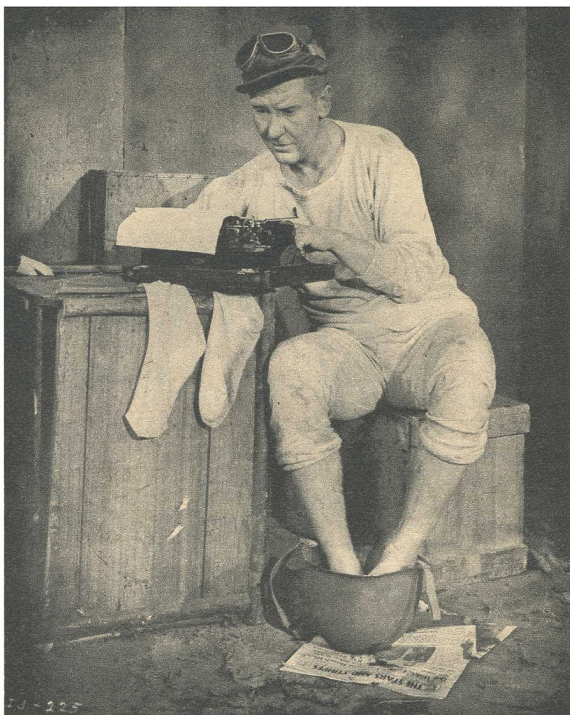


"THE STORY OF G. I. Joe"
